
#### FOR THE LOVE OF A PICKET FENCE

Gorgeous weather and a full pond make for stunning views, but take a closer look at the new white picket fence in the background of the top photo and you'll see one member's Valentine to the Kelley House. Benefactor Alida Morzenti (shown with her dog Trinket in front of the new fence) generously funded the replacement of a large section of the fence fronting Main Street with more historically accurate pickets. What inspires someone to endow a fence? Says Alida, "I had been a regular visitor to Mendocino since the '60s, at various times seeing family or staying at the old Sears House Inn

(now Sweetwater Inn) to grade papers when I was a lecturer at UC Davis. I'd walk past the Kelley House and admire the white picket fence, so gracious and

in keeping with the style of the house. But when I got to the pond it was just a plain ugly board fence. Once I decided to get more involved with the Kelley House, my first wish was to replace that fence!" In the process, she learned how rare the "Mendocino picket" has become and worked with Curator Karen McGrath, who found a company called Blue Ox Millworks in Eureka to custommill the pickets. Scanlon Contracting built it. Alida is interested in helping execute an educational landscaping project next, so stay tuned. In the meantime, take a stroll down Main Street and admire this beautiful new fence. Thank you, Alida!




#### **BOOK OF THE MONTH**


