

Visionary Who Helped Shape the
Chinese-American Experience

Discover the fascinating story of Mendocino-born Look Tin Eli, who, as a



teenager in 1884, set the legal precedent for birthright citizenship. After the 1906 earthquake in San Francisco, he was instrumental in establishing Chinatown as a business center and tourist destination. He founded the first Chinese-owned bank and started a steamship company that carried goods and people between Asia and the Americas. Here's how to get your copy:
